FROM DAVID'S DESK

Hi all. In August 2025, the Parenting Research Centre led a nation-wide survey to get a picture of parenting today. “Drawing on responses from more than 10,000 parents and carers across Australia, the survey shows parent wellbeing is shaped less by factors such as gender or income, and more by experiences such as loneliness, emotional strain, low self-compassion, and feeling unsupported.” (Media release, Parenting Research Centre. parentingrc.org.au, cited 4 June 2026) The survey findings were released in the last couple of weeks.



Last week I happened to listen to an interview on local ABC radio between Steve Austin and one of the researchers. The impact of loneliness as well as high levels of distress amongst families particularly grabbed my attention. This would also be the case amongst other demographic profiles across our communities. Loneliness and distress. There is a mis-match here, isn't there? We live in an era when communication options have never been greater and yet there is a deep sense of dis-connection, distress, and isolation.

When it comes to the findings of this parent survey (especially in regards to social disconnection and distress), what would it look like for us as a congregation to engage with the many parents of young children who walk past our door each morning and afternoon, Monday to Friday, on their way to and from Kindy? Or your adult children and grandchildren? Or those in an older age-bracket who come to Music Lovers, Cool & Classic and The Refreshed Shop who know only too well the impact of loneliness and social isolation?

The Bible does not deny these realities – indeed many passages, especially the Psalms speak to this reality or even more beautifully puts these cries on our lips. “Look and see, there is no one at my right hand; no one is concerned for me. I have no refuge; no one cares for my life. (Psalm 142:4) At one time the prophet Elijah (1 Kings 19) felt utterly abandoned and “the only one left”. God meets him with rest, with food, and then in a quiet whisper. Being open to this same God, how might we meet the needs of lonely, disconnected and despairing parents and other individuals around our community?

May God's peace go with you and before you.

MUSIC LOVERS

May 21:

Young Vocalists of the Conservatorium

What an honour to hear four emerging singers from the Opera School. They were expertly

accompanied by Artemii Safonov. The audience of about 60 clearly agreed.

The program was highly professional, with a variety of songs from the repertoire. Songs were expertly selected to be contrasting in mood, genre and style. Each singer introduced her song beautifully, so the audience had a clear understanding of the essence of the song. Elahe Atefi opened the concert with a moving rendition of a love song by Obradors, a relatively unknown composer.

Esther's strong Soprano voice did justice to Ralph Vaughan Williams's pastoral song cycle. Chelsea provided some comic relief with "Der Kuss" by Beethoven and Samuel Barber's Crucifixion from Hermit Songs sung by Gabriella was suitably intimate and poignant.



During the 2nd half of the concert, I particularly enjoyed the duets as the voices blended beautifully. Artemii's skilful

accompaniment on the piano underlined the mood and style of each piece with great refinement. His solo pieces were captivating: Brahms's Intermezzo in E Major had great tenderness and intimacy. The Debussy was a "tour de force" with Artemii displaying breathtaking virtuosity and great dexterity. Those challenging cross-rhythms seemed effortless under his fingers.

La Speranza "Hope" from 3 Sacred Choruses by Rossini was the final vocal quartet dedicated to KUC. Such a fitting finale to an inspirational morning!

MUSICLOVERS FOR JUNE HELPS AN EXCELLENT CAUSE



Thursday 18 is a **MUST COME** day for Musiclovers who have had so much pleasure from this choir and their leader Rhonda. **READ ON TO FIND OUT WHY.**

Rhonda Davidson Irwin is the outgoing CEO of Music Australia and is also a highly regarded music educator, producer, (television and stage) and performer. She has immense experience in dealing with a variety of audiences and facilitates this in a wide area of genres, including our local community adult and children's choir Viva La Musica Voices and community organisations, professional orchestras, television and film sets and theatre.

Viva La Musica Productions is a current provider for Council and produces one concert per month for the Brisbane City Council's Lord Mayor's City Hall Concerts. Rhonda Davidson-Irwin has taught more than 30,000 children, composed over 3,000 songs for multiple Australian children's TV shows including In the Box, Puzzle Play, Wurrwhy, Hot Source Farm Kids and Crocomole, runs her own dynamic Viva La Musica Productions and has performed for Queen Elizabeth, Bill Clinton and Muhammad Ali.

Tragically on Sunday 10th May Rhonda, having been out celebrating Mother's Day with her family, returned home to find the family home and everything in it burnt to the ground. Happily a neighbour had been able to rescue their family pet, but everything else was lost to the flames, including her beloved grand piano, cello, flutes and other musical instruments as well as personal effects.

Her choir, Viva La Musica Voices, is coming to Music Lovers once again on June 18th and we look forward to some great music and singing. However, on this occasion and in the light of current circumstances, it is planned to donate all the profits from this concert to Rhonda and her choir.

COOL & CLASSIC

We were delighted to hear seven talented musicians deliver an outstanding performance at our second Cool and Classic Concert for 2026. The first half featured opera excerpts, including *The Marriage of Figaro* and *Don Giovanni* by Mozart, as well as works by Purcell, Donizetti, and others. Among the performers were Nicholas, Anthony, Honor, Victoria, and Scarlett, who sang with great skill and polish.

The second half presented a varied program, including *Over the Rainbow* from *The Wizard of Oz*, performed as a duet by Victoria and Scarlett; *If Ever I Would Leave You* from *Camelot*, sung by Nicholas; and *Climb Ev'ry Mountain* from *The Sound of Music*, delivered powerfully by Honor.

The accompanist, Jillian Stoll, once again demonstrated her outstanding talent, adapting skilfully to a wide range of styles and genres.



The passion, emotion, and confidence of these young musicians were a joy to witness, clearly giving the audience a warm and uplifting experience that showed how music can speak when words cannot. **Glenda.**

The seven singers sang an ensemble version of “Can’t help lovin’ dat man of mine” from *Showboat* by Jerome Kern and accompanist and organiser Jill left the piano to join them at the end of the concert to receive the enthusiastic applause of the audience of 76. The attendance was down on the last couple of years, but several of our regulars were away or sick. Despite lower

numbers, we made a profit of \$1,543 and the singers themselves packed the front row right across the church with their family and friends, which was great to see. Several of the young people commented on the great spread for afternoon tea, so thank you to all those who helped in that way.

It was a bonus to have the acoustic piano supported two concerts in one week, with the extra volume and richness it gives. Well done Rosemary for suggesting this move.

With Jan not well, Marion stepped in and supplied the roses on the table and had the lovely idea of giving each of the young people one to take home. Another student supporter (L) was their Senior Lecturer in Voice, Shelli Hulcombe, who was singing with the Australian Chamber Musicians when they inspired the creation of the Cool & Classic series in 2010.

REFRESHED NEWS – MAY

We had some very slow days this month. It seems the unseasonal rain and cold winds kept a lot of regular shoppers at home. However, sales picked up in the final week ... when the sun started shining again.

All our Winter stock is now on display. There are some new beanies (courtesy of our knitting friend, Bev) in all sizes and colours. These are just \$5 each. There is also a collection of football scarves and beanies which will appeal to any sports fans in the family. Women's clothing is by far our biggest market and there have been a lot of new donations: long-sleeved blouses and T-shirts, skirts and pants, cardigans, jackets, pashminas, etc. Special items sell very quickly, so come in soon for a big choice of lovely clothing for the new season.

REFRESHED WINTER APPEALS ARE ON AGAIN

We have been putting aside some **warm clothing to give to Emmanuel City Mission**. A local gentleman, Ross, works for Emmanuel and approached us and asked for our help. Their focus is solely on supporting the homeless on a day-to-day basis. They offer meals, clothing, laundry and showering facilities, help in liaising with welfare agencies and health professionals, plus emotional and spiritual support. The majority of their clients are single men. As we often give surplus men's clothes to Salvos/Lifeline, it is good to have a new outlet where we know these items are truly needed.

It is worth noting that while woollen items are usually warmer than synthetics, they need careful washing so are not always practical. So, if you have any spare men's flannelette shirts, parkas, sweatshirts, jeans, etc, in fairly good condition, we are happy to pass them on.

We are also collecting **rugs and blankets for Micah**. Micah's outreach is far more extensive than Emmanuel's. While they also support the homeless, they are better equipped to deal with the needs of women and families and especially those seeking safe accommodation.

Refreshed is always ready to respond to requests from our local community and beyond for household goods, toys and clothing.

VOLUNTEER NEWS.

Recently we welcomed two new volunteers, Zoe and Nicole. Zoe is now working every Tuesday, and Nicole is doing some hours on Thursdays (between her own job requirements and childcare duties). Both are wonderful additions to our volunteer group. Arini has been off for some time with a painful back, but she is now with us again ... on light duties. Her cheerful presence has been greatly missed so we are happy she is feeling well enough to return. After nearly six months away in Japan, supporting and relocating her elderly parents, Noriko is home and we are delighted to have her back with us at Refreshed. In her absence, her husband, Simon, has been doing not only Noriko's shifts, but also helping us most Fridays. Thanks to Simon, the side room has never looked so tidy. Leng is overseas for all of June.

If anyone could fill in for Leng on Thursdays 11th and 25th this month, it would be greatly appreciated. We also need a volunteer on Wednesday 17th June. Please contact Jenny if you can help on any of these days.

GAZA & WEST BANK: SUPPORTING COMMUNITIES IN CRISIS

**1000s of students reached through education programmes;
100s of children supported in safe learning spaces.**

Despite extreme conditions, partners across Gaza and the West Bank continue delivering lifesaving support. Mobile medical teams and temporary clinics are providing essential healthcare and providing education initiatives. In Gaza, tent-based learning spaces are giving hundreds of displaced children more than education—they offer safety, routine and hope.

JORDAN: SUPPORTING FAMILIES TO BUILD SECURE FUTURES

**50 families launched small businesses; 90% now generating income;
98% increased savings; 100% report sufficient food.**

In Jordan, the Forsa for Youth project has continued empowering vulnerable people through livelihood training, job matching, and psychosocial support. Savings groups and financial literacy sessions also help. Households have been generating income, reducing debt, securing food and 98% children regularly attending school. Families are asking for programme to continue and expand to others.

INDONESIA: STRENGTHENING COMMUNITIES BEFORE DISASTER STRIKES

Agung Pranoto/Act for Peace

**4 flood-prone communities strengthened;
COMMUNITY-LED RESPONSE now leading preparedness;
EARLY WARNING SYSTEMS in place to reduce flood impact.**

Local disaster committees now active, early warning systems established and families received support to restart small businesses after floods.

One community member said flooding damaged her sewing machine so she could not work. With small livelihood support and training, she was able to repair her machine and restart her home business.

ZIMBABWE: SUPPORTING FARMERS, STRENGTHENING FUTURES

Tobin Jones/Act for Peace

**161 farmers trained (99 women, 62 men);
5 communities now with reliable water access;
4,000 + households benefitting from improved water access.**

In Zimbabwe, partners have continued supported small farmers to adapt to climate challenges. In recent months, farmers have been learning practical skills in aquaculture management, feed formulation and fingerling production. 33,000 fingerlings have been distributed and farmers are expected to harvest around 10 metric tonnes of fish, valued at about USD30,000, providing both nutrition and new income. Additional infrastructure like grading sheds and multi-crop threshers will increase productivity, reduce losses and improve crop value.

Five communities now have reliable water access through wetland protection, construction of weirs and solar-powered boreholes. These communities can now grow crops year-round improving food security and income stability. (This is now vital in Zimbabwe where so much US Aid supporting medical, educational and economic development programmes has been withdrawn.)

FAREWELL TO MARGOT JEFFERY – 3.11.1942 – 24.4.2026



(Several church members have told us the Memorial Service for Margot, was blessed with visual samples of the creativity which was such a part of her and slides and snapshots also of the many activities in which she was engaged. I have compiled from the audio, some snippets from the tributes which show the variety of facets that Margot demonstrated in her life. I apologise for any inaccuracies which will be entirely my misunderstanding. Dawn.)

Margot Alberta Jeffery was born in Tiel in Holland and she loved all things Dutch, especially the sweets and the crafts, having grown up with hand-made clothes and toys. Her parents were both pharmacists and she had a younger sister and brother, Marietta and Dolf. They all moved to New Zealand in 1953. Not long ago, she went on a great holiday driving trip there, met up with cousins and visited places where she had been with her husband Rob and enjoyed the cooler weather.

After finishing at the Christchurch Girls' High School in New Zealand, she went back to Europe and found a flat in London and a job with World Air Tours. She had three aims: to gain a University Degree, to travel, to be married and have a family, so this job fulfilled one dream. She went as a tour guide on world trips, translated, organised money and parties, with France, Tahiti, Austria and Switzerland among her favourite destinations.

One Boxing Day, at a house party, she met Rob, but her work took her to many places, and he was in the army so they were often apart. He was sent to Germany and she was in the Austrian Alps. Then he visited Venice on his own and decided that was enough and wrote and proposed marriage. They were married on the 23rd March, 1973 in New Zealand. Not long ago, she was saying how blessed she was to have his devotion and so much happiness. They started in Canberra, then Papua New Guinea where Scott was born and Brisbane where Justin arrived, meaning she had the family she had hoped for. In 1982 she fulfilled her third goal and gained her teaching degree. She spoke five languages and became a language teacher and continued doing relief teaching into her sixties.

She was an inspiration to her boys, saying you should keep learning, read as much as you can and learn to speak to someone from another country.

With Rob's career as an army doctor, they kept moving – over to San Antonio Texas, then to Sydney, then back to Brisbane. Brisbane was a very quiet town and they had not planned to stay, but then came Expo and Margot was very excited and enrolled as a volunteer which meant they all had season tickets. That seemed to be the turning point in their roving life and when Rob left the army, they stayed on in Brisbane. She didn't like camping and the outdoors which meant that Rob and the two boys could go off on their bush adventures and she would keep up her creative interests.

Despite the difficulties of caring for Rob in his long illness, she kept contact with many organisations, Probus, Inner Wheel, Schoolhouse Quilters, the Bridge Club, Rotary and of course her church. She was determined to keep her independence and kept driving herself everywhere she needed to go. The boys said their mother was stoic, genuine, had a real appreciation of time with other people and cherished friendships. She had a way of remembering people's names and their interests.

This theme was echoed in a tribute from a representative from the Schoolhouse Quilters who said Margot was a gifted and valued member. She participated in three of the trips as part of Women Out West, established to support women during the long drought. Margot led classes, joining in activities enthusiastically and sharing that enthusiasm with others. On one trip, she went for a walk in the morning and realised time had run away for her to get back to town. She talked to some men working on the roads and ended up coming back in their truck in time to take her class. She excelled in quilting, knitting, card making, Christmas decorations and could also share her skills and enthusiasm with others. Justin wrote "Thank you all her beautiful friends. You meant the world to her."

Those of us at KUC know about Margot's skill in teaching craft, from many Women's Fellowship meetings when she came prepared with everything to allow even the least handy to go home with a hand-crafted Christmas Card. Also in the days when the Women's Evening Fellowship had speakers, she was often the one who provided a hand-made quilted bag or other gift for the speaker. And of course, the quilts – ready for Card Day, or a farewell gift for a minister or any other special purpose. She also read the bible beautifully on her rostered days and was famous for her delicious egg sandwiches.

Personally, apart from her help with my amateur quilting, I won't forget that whenever I sent out a Prayer Request, Margot would always email a short note back expressing thanks for being kept up to date and also a sympathetic comment for whatever need was the basis of the request. Dawn.

A retired teacher in her 70s living in Cairns Retirement Centre, she is restricted in her outings, especially on weekends. She was researching for an assignment for a Broadcasting course from Adelaide University, so David asked me to help.

I talked on the phone about our Cool & Classic series and MusicLovers. Sadly our Thursday MusicLovers clashes with her hydrotherapy. She was very interested in the effect of the Best of the Con concert and I emailed our contact Jill and asked for some comments. Jill emailed two students from last year's cohort and sent back comments from herself and the students. Our friend's assignment was due the day after our concert and she worked the responses into her "interviews" for the programme script she was writing. The result was a Distinction, her first in this course, with particular mention of her 'interviews'. She was very excited and we have notified Jill. So a lady in confined circumstances received a huge boost of confidence, was touched by the young people who took time to write a few sentences, and

two young people have received reinforcement for their kindness. Who knows how far the ripples of music and kindness can go?
