

Sharing the Story: An Invitation to Experience Mission Support

DID YOU KNOW that your Mission Support helps fund important initiatives across the synod? Your contributions are making a significant impact and helping others grow in faith, supporting the synod's lanes of Growing Young, Gaining Strength, and Going Beyond Death to Life, along with the values of Loving, Healing, and Engaging like Jesus.

As a God's Work, our Hands Storyteller (formally Mission Interpreter) for over 13 years I have had the privilege to share stories and say Thank You to many congregations in our synod. Charlotte Gross and I currently coordinate the storytelling ministry. We are invited to visit congregations for worship, meet with congregation councils or be part of faith formation.

I have learned about all the ministries in our synod and the ELCA including our ecumenical partners. When I first started exploring the ministries, it was overwhelming to know the support that changed many lives by doing God's work in the world. The Witness and Service Ministry Team receives a portion annually from your Mission Support giving that is used to fund grants for outreach projects and events. My own congregation has applied and used grants for outreach in my community. If I would not have been involved and understood how mission support giving is used, our outreach may not have happened. In my role, I receive the evaluations after a grant is completed. This gives me the opportunity to contact the sponsors and find out more about how the money was used. Many of the conversations are turned into stories that are shared on the synod website at godslove.org/missionsupport or under Resources, Mission Support on the synod's website.

There are many ways you could be part of the team of storytellers. I have met many people in the pews through visits or on the phone/zoom to hear how their ministries are helping others because we all share our Mission Support giving. We can do so much more together than any individual can do alone.

When I first started sharing stories and saying thank you to congregations, I had no idea that my life would be enriched by their stories and eagerness to do more. Many times, I have heard, "I can't believe our mission support giving helps do this. I had no idea."

Mission Support can be understood better and communicated with the help of various resources. The resources can be found on the synod website at godslove.org/missionsupport or under Resources, Mission Support. The resources are designed to be used in various media formats. The best way to gain insight into the vital importance of Mission Support is regular sharing of stories, including an inperson visits from a God's Work, Our Hands Storyteller. 


MISSION SUPPORT: WHAT DOES MY OFFERING DO?

Every week, Lutherans across the country gather to worship. Many of us give to our congregation as part of this experience. ELCA members give about \$1.6 billion annually as regular offerings to ELCA congregations and worshiping communities. When you give your offering, most of it stays with your congregation to fund its vital work. A portion — about 5%, on average — becomes Mission Support, given by your congregation to your synod. Because of Mission Support, our hands can do God's work in more places than any one person or




congregation could alone. Together we experience the way of Jesus; discover community, justice and love; and help more people experience the difference God's grace and love in Christ make for all people and creation.

Your **MISSION SUPPORT** funds a variety of churchwide ministries.



38% BUILDS CHRISTIAN COMMUNITIES in the United States by enabling us to:

- · Plant and support hundreds of worshiping communities.
- Revitalize congregational ministries and reach out to their surrounding communities.
- Promote leadership opportunities, discernment and education through leadership initiatives.
- Support the work of seven ELCA seminaries and 27 ELCA colleges and universities.
- · Host events and leadership opportunities for youth and young adults.
- Support regional work through directors for evangelical mission as well as candidacy and leadership managers.
- Prepare and implement a system for recruiting and assigning rostered ministers.



Look no further than your refrigerator to save energy. Here's a few of a July 21st post on **one5c**. Check out the entire article on their website.

Did you know that refrigeration and freezing account for about 7% of electricity use in the average U.S. home. Seems like as good a chance to shave off some excess electrons as any, no? We probably all know the basics of improving the energy efficiency of a fridge (ahem, keep the dang door closed!), but confusion around other particulars abounds. For example: The internet is full of conflicting advice about how much the fullness of a fridge can impact how well it runs. But putting aside how jammed your chiller is or what model you have, there are plenty of ways to make sure it's not needlessly hoovering up energy—and driving up emissions and your electric bill in the process.

1. Set the Right Temps

Avoid needlessly ratcheting down the thermostat in either the fridge or the freezer. The Department of Energy recommends setting the fridge temperature between 35 and 38 degrees Fahrenheit, with optimal performance right around 37. No matter what, though, keep everything below 40, which is the USDA's threshold for keeping perishable food safe to eat. The freezer should be set to 0.

2. Clean the Coils

A condenser coil, which is most often located in the back of your fridge, is responsible for releasing heat and regulating the inside temperature. But the outward-facing network of tubes tends to accumulate dust. When too much covers it, that gunk barrier can make it more difficult to dissipate heat, causing the fridge to work harder. Cleaning the condenser coils every few months with a Swiffer-style wand and dust pad can to ensure a fridge is operating more efficiently. One important safety PSA: Unplug the fridge before you do this.

3. Give It Room to Breathe

Just as vital as keeping the condenser coils clean: Making sure they have room to do their work. Avoid pushing the fridge flush against the wall so that hot air has space to dissipate away from the appliance. Energy Star recommends maintaining a few (translation: 2 to 3) inches of distance.
