Connections Pastor Phil The Kingdom of God is Near

We often pray, but may not consciously think about, the words of the Lord's Prayer. "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on Earth as it is in heaven". Jesus teaches his disciples this prayer in the hope that their understanding of heaven, being a place of justice, love, compassion and peace, would be brought to Earth as well. In other words, its Jesus' hope for the Earth.

Recently in our Sunday Morning adult class, we have been studying the "Kingdom of God". The Kingdom of God is the central teaching of Jesus in the Gospels. Too often, Christians think the Kingdom of God has to do with the afterlife, that's not Jesus' understanding! I will show you why most Christians think that the Kingdom has to do with the afterlife.

Matthew is written after the Gospel of Mark. Mark's Gospel is the template for Matthew and Luke. Matthew uses 90% of Mark in his Gospel, and many times when Matthew quotes Mark he changes Mark in consistent ways. Matthew is a Jewish writer, writing to a Jewish audience. Jewish people did not like to "name God", because once you "name God" you control God. When Mark writes stories or parables about the Kingdom of God, Matthew changes them to Kingdom of Heaven. And so, Christians to this day think the Kingdom of God, is simply a place we go after we die.

Mark 1:15

"The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news."

Matthew 4:17

From that time Jesus began to proclaim, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near."

Mark 4:30-31

Jesus said, "With what can we compare the <u>kingdom of God</u>, or what parable will we use for it? It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth;

Matthew 13:31

Jesus put before them another parable: "The <u>kingdom of heaven</u> is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field;

Mark 10:23

Then Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, "How hard it will be for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!"

Matthew 19:23

Then Jesus said to his disciples, "Truly I tell you; it will be hard for a rich person to enter the kingdom of heaven.

This is only the tip of the iceberg when you compare the two gospels side by side. For Jesus, The Kingdom of God, is not a place, as much as it is a mentality, a way of living and being in the world. Rich people will have an afterlife, but will they will have difficulty entering the KINGDOM OF GOD MENTALITY! I believed that Jesus wanted this Kingdom of God mentality here on Earth, a mentality of abundance, love, grace, forgiveness, and dependence upon others. When we are financially rich, it can be difficult to accept our dependence upon others, until of course, we get sick, lose our wealth, or a tragedy occurs, and then we realize money cannot buy a KINGDOM OF GOD MENTALITY.

I am a proud progressive Christian. Jesus was most concerned with how we live, not whether we believe in the virgin birth or inerrancy of scripture. The progressive movement is centered on ORTHOPRAXIS, the standard ways of following Jesus, not ORTHODOXY, the standard beliefs of Christianity. Our actions matter. Jesus calls us to action, not to accept a list of beliefs.

In this season of Advent, I live with HOPE. Hope that followers of Jesus will work at living in such a way that the kingdom of God will be lived out here on earth. That is Jesus' mission, and it is our calling as well.

The Christmas spirit of generosity, goodwill, peace to all, is part of this Kingdom mentality. Be a KINGDOM BUILDER year-round. Jesus is depending on us!

Growing New Communities of Faith: Updates on SAWCs, SAOMs, and Mission Leadership

Every year, the Synod Council re-authorizes our Synod-authorized ministries, typically in October. It is also a great opportunity to hear updates from these ministries, the people they are serving, and the stories of their communities. It is always a powerful testament to God among us – often in ways we might consider "non-traditional" – ministries made possible by our NEPA congregations' mission support and the mission support to the ELCA.

Synod-Authorized Worshipping Communities (SAWCs for short) are communities committed to worshipping together but who may do so outside the normal "walls" of the church. A SAWC may look like a recovery worship service, dinner church, messy

church, or church on the streets. SAWCs are also communities discerning and taking steps to become formal (known as "organized") ELCA congregations. They are led by a Mission Developer. Our NEPA Synod currently has 3 SAWCs: Common Ground in Wyomissing, Common Ground in Reading, and the Indonesian Lutheran Church of Scranton (which just become a SAWC in September!).

Synod-Authorized Outreach Ministries (SAOMs for short) are ministries committed to evangelism, outreach, and discipleship. A SAOM may look like a food truck ministry, a small group ministry, or a prison ministry. They are led by a SAOM Leader. Our NEPA Synod currently has 2 SAOMs: Free to Be in Bethlehem and Hope's Table in Reading. Free to Be is a ministry dedicated to reaching out to moms, families, and folks in recovery by building intentional small groups on the road of faith and discipleship. Hope's Table was initially a SAWC but is in the process of transitioning to a SAOM. While Hope's Table continues to offer weekly worship, it is a feeding ministry which builds community and creates a safe and welcoming space for all to find the love, grace, and warmth of Jesus.

Each year, to help support these leaders and connect them to one another, the ELCA hosts a Mission Leadership Training Conference for Mission Developers, SAOM Leaders, Strategic Ministry Leaders, and key leaders of various SAWCs and SAOMs. This year Seminarian April Mulvey was invited to attend as a Mission Developer Scholarship recipient along with Deacon Kat Tigerman as DEM. 118 leaders from across



the country attended the 3-day training in Chicago the last weekend of September.

The first week of October, the Region 7 DEMs (Directors for Evangelical Mission) hosted a 2-day retreat for Mission Developers, SAOM Leaders, and other new ministry leaders. There were 35 participants across the 6 Synods of Region 7 who came together to worship, reflect, connect, learn, and pray. The Retreat was facilitated by the ELCA's Organizing for Mission who grounded the time theologically as well as provided practical on-the-ground skills and tools for these leaders are the margins and cutting edges of Church. NEPA Synod participants included:

Region 7 was blessed to receive an ELCA grant to help make this retreat affordable to leaders who are serving ministries on the margins. Our Director of New Ministries will be piloting a learning opportunity in early 2026 to work alongside leaders who have a new ministry idea that they want to develop into a plan of action.

We have recycling pick up here in Hellertown but there are additional recycling options available for a variety of items. Here are a few choices.

- 1. Metal objects: Blindermans on Whitaker Street here on the west side of town, they weigh your copper, steel, iron, etc. and pay you for it. It's pretty easy and a great way to get rid of stuff while making a few bucks.
- 2. Best Buy, there is one off Rt 33 at Freemansburg Ave. They will accept up to 3 electronic devices per visit by you. They don't take huge old tv's, I suggest you check their website for specifics.
- 3. Visit Aardvark Shoes in the old Orr's building on Main Street in downtown Bethlehem. They take old sneakers for recycling. If they are in good condition they donate to folks in need of shoes. Big bin on right side of the checkout counter (inside) by the store entrance.
- 4. Fuel oil recycling in Wilson Boro on 25th Street. They will come and drain old fuel tanks, even big ones and their prices are pretty reasonable. Call for an appointment with them: 610-250-8747.
- 5. Battery Recyclers of America, 1951 Glenwood St, Allentown, 4<mark>2559, 610-</mark>791-6809. Suggest that you call to confirm that they take your particular battery and the hours they are open.
- 6. Clothing and household items can be dropped off at the second hand store next to McDonald's. They even have a convenient drive through!
- 7. ReStore on Main Street just down from our church on the other side of Main Street. They have lots of construction materials and tools as well as kitchen wares, clothes, furniture and other good stuff at reasonable prices.

So, that's seven different places to recycle your stuff to. Get rid off the things you don't need anymore, you'll feel better for it than if you've been trashing them!




