Pastor's Corner

Beloved in Christ,

Some time ago I purchased a prayer book called *Celtic Daily Prayer*, which I have used off and on from time to time in my personal devotions, and one of the prayers that I have spent some time with lately is a corporate prayer in several parts that includes a refrain that reads as follows:

I cannot speak unless you loose my tongue; I only stammer and I speak uncertainly, but if you touch my mouth, my Lord, then I will sing the story of Your wonders.

Words are powerful. Words are weak. Words can be difficult sometimes. Words can free the heart to express tremendous joys and do extraordinary things when we find the right ones. The words of this prayer remind me that words can also be a potent means of grace--- especially after a season of feeling like we can't find our words or struggle for words or lack confidence with words. "But if you touch my mouth, O Lord," says the prayer echoing the prophetic calls of the likes of an Isaiah or an Ezekiel, "then I will sing the story of Your wonders." The divine touch in this prayer comes with the power to transform the speaker, free the tongue, and empower words that sing with confidence a story that, before, could never have found its way into the light of day.

As we enter into the month of February, I've been thinking a great deal about words, and the work that our words accomplish (or don't accomplish). What might a divine touch to our lips do in us? What might it birth into our world? We have been spending time with Jesus' words in worship lately as we've steadily been working our way through the Sermon on the Plain, and certainly those words have the power to transform relationships, communities, ways of being in the world when their message is heard and lived. If nothing else, they call our hearts into a new sort of shape and for a harder sort of work—true reconciliation, true peace-making, true repair between enemies, between the haves and have-nots. A call to each and every one of us to turn our attentions back to ourselves and to the logs in our eyes. Work born of words.

Perhaps this is a month to do some self-examining. What work are my words doing? Are they effective in doing God's work? Telling God's story? Do they mend or divide? Heal and hurt? Pave pathways or burn bridges? Do they merely satisfy something in my heart or are they effec-

tive? And what could make my words actually be more effective for good? I leave that with you this month as we continue to wrestle together through Jesus' many challenges with words.

I was fortunate to be able to attend the 55th Annual Martin Luther King Memorial Jr. Breakfast with Claire this year in Boston. This 1,500-person event is organized by a Committee whose mission is to 'inspire, empower, and organize the community to bring about real, tangible change in the systemic injustices, inequalities, and inequities that plague our nation' and is sponsored by two Boston area churches (Methodist & Episcopal).

Per the program - We gathered to convene, to envision, and to embody the Beloved Community that we yearn for; to break bread and to be nourished for the urgent work of justice and equity in our community, and we gathered to remember Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., whose legacy of organizing and leadership inspires us today for the difficult road ahead of building the Beloved Community

There were various speakers in attendance - Maura Healey, Governor of Massachusetts, Segun Idowu from the Mayor's Office, Ed Markey, Senator and Ayanna Pressley, Congresswoman. The theme this year was "Freedom Isn't Free" and the keynote speaker was professor, author and activist Angela Davis.

The energy in the room was palpable as she spoke about how every year we see evidence of why we need to continue to fight discrimination and that civil rights gains didn't lead to economic gains for all. She quoted MLK that "we must accept finite disappointment but never lose infinite hope" meaning that even when facing setbacks and disappointments, we should <u>never</u> let go of our belief in a better future and the possibility of positive change.

She ended with a powerful statement which resonated with me. I no longer accept the things I cannot change. I'm changing the things I can no longer accept. Maybe it resonates with you too.



Consider these words from the *Jesus Sto-rybook Bible* by Sally Lloyd-Jones:

"...would you have done just what these children did-run straight up to Jesus and let him pick you up in his arms and swing you and kiss you and hug you and then sit you on his lap and listen to your stories and your chats?

You see, children loved Jesus, and they knew they didn't need to do anything special for Jesus to love them. All they needed to do was to run into his arms. And so that's just what they did.

Well, after all the laughing and games, Jesus turned to his helpers and said, "No matter how big you grow, never grow up so much that you lose your child's heart: full of trust in God. Be like these children. They are the most important in my kingdom."



NH Chronicle host Sean McDonald will feature Harriet Wilson, the first African American woman to publish a novel in North America, in an upcoming episode of NH Chronicle. Filmed at the Nehemiah Hayward Homestead in Milford, the program will honor the 200th anniversary of Wilson's birth and her groundbreaking novel. Told in the first person and based on her own life, the novel sheds light on the realities of race and servitude in 19thcentury New England. Wilson titled her book, "Our Nig, or Sketches from the Life of a Free Black; In a Two-Story White House, North, Showing that Slavery's Shadows Fall Even There"
