Dear MUMC Family,

November is a month of remembrance. As the air cools and the days shorten, the Church pauses to give thanks for those who have gone before us in faith. On **All Saints Sunday**, we remember the "great cloud of witnesses" (Hebrews 12:1) who have run the race before us—those whose lives have pointed us toward Christ.

For John Wesley, founder of the Methodist movement, All Saints was a day of deep gratitude and holy joy. He wrote in his journal, "I always find this a comfortable day." To Wesley, the saints were not distant heroes but living examples—ordinary people transformed by extraordinary grace. He reminded the early Methodists that sainthood was not reserved for a select few but was the calling of every believer: to be made perfect in love, reflecting Christ's holiness in heart and life.

As United Methodists, we share in that same calling. When we celebrate All Saints, we honor not only those whose names are written in stained glass or in church history books, but also the quiet saints who shaped our lives—teachers, parents, mentors, neighbors, and friends. Their faith continues to shape the Church today.

In Wesley's view, holiness was never a private matter. He believed that "there is no holiness but social holiness," meaning that our faith must find expression in love of neighbor, works of mercy, and justice for the oppressed. The saints show us what that looks like—faith lived out in community, in service, in witness, and in compassion.

As we name the saints of our congregation and community this All Saints Sunday, let us give thanks for their witness—and let us hear again Christ's call to follow in their footsteps. For the communion of saints is not only a remembrance of the past; it is the living body of Christ, present and active today.

Let this be our prayer: that we, too, may live as saints—grateful for grace, steadfast in faith, and alive in love.





At the end of September Claire and I went to Jaffrey to see an event sponsored by Leadership New Hampshire entitled 'Join or Die, a Conversation with Dr. Robert Putnam' who has roots in Jaffrey and is the author of 'Bowling Alone'. That book used the metaphor of less & less people doing social activities like bowling to discuss how community cooperation has declined significantly since the mid 1900's. The Park Theatre was lovely – (and we saw some other MUMC folks there too!). From the brochure: Across the country, including here in NH, we see deep divisions, frayed trust, and neighbors more disconnected than ever. Dr. Putnam's research reminds us that civic renewal doesn't happen by accident. It happens when people step forward, rebuild bonds of trust, and invest in the strength of community life.'

He mentioned some causes of the place we find ourselves in now: a shrinking sense of 'we' (versus 'l') in society; class based social isolation and a lack of 'seeing' those in crisis.

I took away 3 avenues to pursue to solve these problems: get the young people involved – they have passion; start local with grassroots efforts; and our 'individualist' thinking needs to change to 'we or communitarian' thinking.

I found a lot of parallels to what he was saying with our faith and our Social Principles. We are told to love our neighbor, to help those in need and to advocate for the marginalized.

I found it to be time well spent and was glad I went. It gave me a lot to think about...maybe I'll check out his new book 'The Upswing: How America Came Together a Century Ago and How We Can Do It Again'.

Remembering The Saints

When Paul wrote to the church in Rome, he addressed his letter "To all God's beloved ... who are called to be saints" (Romans 1:7, NRSV). Paul regarded his fellow believers as people who have responded to the good news of Christ by choosing to follow and serve God.

The New Testament emphasizes that Christians are God's beloved — special people set apart to receive his grace and to be his witnesses. All people whose minds and hearts are devoted to God are "called to be saints."

About 700 years after the church began, leaders designated November 1 as All Saints' Day to honor people whose lives reflect Christ dwelling within them. Because of what God has done for us, all Christians can wear the label of saint.

A Day to Honor Our Veterans

On November 11, 1918, the Germans and the Allied Nations, which included the United States, signed a document to initiate an armistice (cessation of hostilities), thus ending World War I. A year later, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation designating November 11 as Armistice Day. It was to be a day of reflection — a day to remember those who died in the country's service and to offer Americans the opportunity "to show sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nation."

Wanting to recognize more specifically America's veterans, Congress passed a bill changing the name of the day from Armistice Day to Veterans Day. The change was made in May 1954.

On this national holiday, churches around the nation hold services of prayers and praise. Followers of the Prince of Peace pray for peace among the nations of Earth and for the day when "they shall

beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more" (Isaiah 2:4, NRSV).

Safer Sanctuary Corner By Dave Haag

The relationships between our baptismal covenants, making boundaries, and safer sanctuaries.

The UMC General Council has determined that the practice of keeping boundaries is closely tied to our baptismal vows. I will discuss that premise below.


A baptism at church is one of my favorite times at the church. Typically, we have a young family making vows for their tiny infant. Baptism vows to renounce wickedness, reject evil, repent sins, and accepting the power that God will give us to prevail. We agree that Jesus Christ is our Savior and put our whole trust in His grace as we promise to serve Him.

As I reflect on this Covenant, I think about what we as a congregation are also reaffirming to. The pastor asks us several questions, which we automatically respond with "I do". But have you ever really looked at, thought and prayed about what we are saying? We as a congregation in addition to the parents promise to love, nurture and protect this newest member of our Christian faith. Not just for that day, or while they are children, but forever! This is a mutual commitment to love, protect, and nurture.

The baptismal covenant helps define who we are and helps to establish the identity of the church. Our United Methodist Church leadership has stated that boundary setting and accountability protocols are an integral part of rejecting and resisting evil, injustice, and oppression in any form. These are therefore closely tied to our baptismal covenant.

Therefore, boundary setting and keeping are an important part of the church's identity. This identity of keeping all people safe and ensuring that everyone feels safe when they enter our church is

important for the communities both inside and outside of the church to know. Developing boundaries and accountability measurements is the task of the Safer Sanctuaries Committee. As our baptismal covenant empowers other ministries to be able to thrive in the community outside of church. So will Safer Sanctuaries policies reach beyond our church walls. This ministry will help to make our community safer.
