Hearing Loop
Switch hearing aid to T-coil

indicates the presence of a hearing loop and prompts you to turn on your T-coil Program.

If you don't have a T-coil equipped instrument, it alerts you to borrow a loop listener.



How to Benefit From a Hearing Loop

All you need is a hearing aid or cochlear implant with a telecoil program.

(and your current hearing instrument may already have a telecoil option)

You Can Choose Between:

- telecoil only (which will amplify only the speaker)
- telecoil + microphone (which amplifies both the speaker and the sound in the room)
- There are two separate programs: (1) T only and (2) T + mic

Note: a telecoil program is not the same as a telephone program.





Ask Your Audiologist To:

- add a telecoil program to your instrument
- demonstrate how to activate your telecoil program when you see the above sign
- practice activating your telecoil program with your Audiologist
- assure the acoustic indicator (beep or voice) is loud enough to confirm program button use

If you are unable to activate the program independently, teach a friend or family member to activate the program for you.

If you have dexterity challenges, ask for a remote control demonstration. Remote controls are available in different sizes to assist with dexterity challenges.
