Expectations at all times:

The following verses are the basis for our expectations during Jannali Kids' Programs:

Matthew 22:36-39:

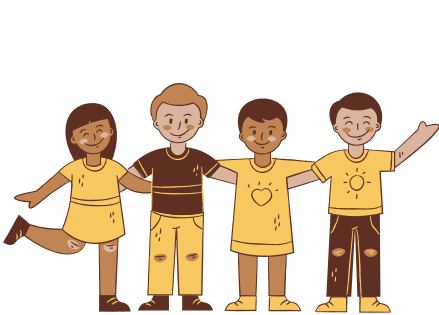
"Teacher, what is the most important commandment in the Law?"

Jesus answered:

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, and mind. This is the first and most important commandment.

The second most important commandment is like this one. And it is, Love others as much as you love yourself."

So that we can all stay safe, have fun, and learn about Jesus, all Kids at Jannali Kids' Programs are expected to follow **The 3 RPs.**



Respect **P**eople

E.g., show love, kindness and fairness in all interactions.

Questions leaders might ask:

Was snatching that toy kind and loving to Jimmy? What is something you can do to be more kind to him?



Respect **P**roperty

E.g., be careful (not careless) with the building and other items that God has given us to use.

Questions leaders might ask:

What will happen if we throw the tennis racquet on the ground in anger? What is a more careful way to use it?



Respect **P**rogram

E.g., listen to leaders and participate in all activities so that everyone can learn and have fun.

Questions leaders might ask:

When you talk when the leader is up the front teaching the Bible, what happens to others' learning? What are some ways we can help one another learn from the Bible?



What leaders might say when a child doesn't uphold these expectations:

1. Remind Leaders can remind the child of the expectations using collective language that describes the behaviour we expect to see..

"Remember, in the talk we keep our listening lips locked"

2. Review Leaders can review the child's repeated behaviour by checking on their emotions, describing their behaviour, checking their understanding, and encouraging them to make a better choice.

1. How are you feeling?

2. I noticed that you have called out a few times now.

3. Do you know why we have "1 hand 1 voice" during the Bible reading?

4. I'd like you to come back to the group and try again.

3. Remind again and Warn Leaders can remind the child of the expectations, adding a warning that if they do it again, they will be returned to church with their adult.

"I noticed you are still calling out and disrupting the talk. If you choose to do it again, I will have to take you back to your adults in church."

4. Return to their adult

If, after the leader has followed these steps, the child is still unable to follow expectations in a way that is disruptive to the group, the leader may choose to return the child to their adult back in church.

"I have given you a few warnings and you still choose to disrupt the group. Because of this, you will have to go back into church. I hope you can come back next week because we really love having you in the group."
