Introducing John's Gospel

As the name suggests, this book was written by John, the son of Zebedee, one of Jesus' 12 disciples. Sometimes he refers to himself as the 'disciple whom Jesus loved' (John 13:23, 19:23). John wrote his account of Jesus life later than most of the other New Testament documents, probably between AD 70-95. If you have read the other three gospels (known as the 'Synoptic Gospels') you will notice the big differences in style and content. John's Gospel contains more large passages of Jesus teaching, deeper symbolism on the lifegiving identity of Jesus (think of the famous 'I am' statements') and less actual activity narrated. This gives John's Gospel a sense of depth as the reader is presented with a rich, multi-layered, and cosmic display of the identity, works, words, and mission of Jesus.

Apart from the Prologue (1:1-18) and the Epilogue (21:1-25) Bible scholars typically see three main structural sections in the book:

- The 'book of signs' (chapters 1-10) in which Jesus reveals his identity
- A transition (chapters 11-12) in which Jesus' mission to die becomes apparent
- The 'book of glory' (chapters 13-20) which focuses on the last week of Jesus life

Along with this big picture we also recommend that you keep returning to two things as you work your way through John. First, the Prologue (1:1-18) in which John's major themes are foreshadowed (e.g. the divinity of Jesus, Jesus' identity as the Messiah, Jesus as the source of life, salvation through belief in Jesus, different responses to Jesus etc.). Second, John's explicit statement about why he wrote the book:

John 20:30 Jesus performed many other signs in the presence of His disciples that are not written in this book. ³¹ But these are written so that you may believe Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and by believing you may have life in His name.

John wants his readers to come to saving faith in Jesus. But given the depth of his material, he also wants believers to grow into a rich, vibrant relationship with Jesus. Our hope and prayer is that as you read John's gospel, that you also would find life in Jesus.

The format of these studies

The format of the studies for this term are deliberately different to past series'. For each week we have reproduced the same 8 general, open questions. Broadly speaking, the questions take you through a process of bible observation ("What happens in the passage"), bible interpretation ("What does this mean") and bible application ("How should we respond"). There are a number of reasons we're trying this new approach:

- 1. **To grow confidence in God's word:** We're convinced that by the power of the Holy Spirit, anyone can read the biblical text carefully and arrive at many helpful insights that can encourage, challenge and grow us. Sometimes a long list of questions overcomplicates things and distracts us from this task. Or worse, we can become more interested in interpreting the questions and trying to answer them, than being led by the text itself.
- 2. **To develop Bible reading skills:** In God's kindness, our aim is that as we do this, we will develop in our ability to read the Bible well for ourselves. That is, to learn to look for the types of things that will help us understand a passage well.
- 3. **Flexibility:** This format can be used by any individual or group, in whatever setting they find themselves in. You might like to use these questions with a friend or family member
- 4. **Simplicity:** This approach will allow you, and your Growth Group leaders to approach the biblical text in the same way each week.

We recognize that this approach might not 'gel' with your style of thinking. Please have a go! And don't worry if there are questions about the passage which remain unanswered. The aim is to discern the main thrust of a passage and be changed by what we learn. To help you out, we've added a couple of bonus application questions for each chapter to help stimulate discussion after you've worked through the first 8 questions.

- Jesus' coming meant that the old covenant ways of relating to God (such as ritual purification and temple sacrifices) were done away with. Are there any 'old ways' of relating to God that you need to do away with now that Jesus has come?
- We see an assertive (even angry) side of Jesus in 2:13-16. How does this make you feel? Is this consistent with your existing understanding of Jesus and his character?
