PASTOR'S BLOG

This past Monday, I returned from a 12 day pilgrimage in Italy that took us from Rome, to Assisi, to Florence, to Siena and Orvieto. As pilgrims of hope, we were able to experience our Catholic faith and tradition in a very tangible way that provides a sure and certain hope of salvation that was won for us by Jesus Christ. As I said in my last blog, after returning from pilgrimage, I will have a lot to say...I was not lying. There was a lot to take in, to digest and reflect upon. Over these next few blogs, I will try to unpack some of those experiences.

Assisi

When we arrived in Rome, we transferred by coach bus to Assisi. This was my third time in Assisi as I had been here in 2005 as part of a pilgrimage after World Youth Day in Cologne and then in 2012 with my seminary classmates. And like these times, the city did not disappoint. There is a calm and peaceful atmosphere that allows one to just receive the beauty of the Umbria region and to hear the whispers of God speaking through the frescos of the Churches and the lives of the saints.

Our first bit of time in Assisi was spent at [Saint Mary of the Angels](#). Walking into the Church for the third time in 20 years was still breathtaking. Here, we celebrated our first Mass as a pilgrimage group and here the tone was set. Everyone on the pilgrimage was there for a reason, a purpose. God had brought us together and there was something that He wanted us to receive. The Gospel of the day allowed us to reflect on the "Cost of Discipleship" - *If anyone wants to be my disciple, they must take up their cross and follow me*. I didn't have to work too hard at preparing a homily for this Mass because we were in the presence of saints who literally did this - St. Francis of Assisi, St. Claire and Blessed Carlos Acutis.

The next day, the feast of the Chair of St. Peter, we began the day with Mass at [Santa Chiara](#) where St. Claire is buried. What I received from this Mass and our time spent at the Church was how St. Clair died: "Go securely and in peace, my blessed soul. The One who created you and made you holy has always loved you tenderly as a mother her dear child. And you, Lord, are blessed because You have created me." Just a holy and peaceful death...not attached to the world's goods, but to God.

It is also the Church where the original San Damiano cross hangs:

The Crucifix of San Damiano was brought by the Poor Clares to the Proto-Monastery of Saint Clare in Assisi, in 1257, when they moved from the church of San Damiano. It is the crucifix before which St Francis prayed in 1205 receiving the call to work for the Church of the Lord: "Go Francis, and rebuild my house which, as you can see, is falling into ruin". Francis first interpreted the voice of Christ as a request for the restoration of the little church of San Damiano, only later did he understand that the Lord was calling him to work for the Church made of living stones.

We then went on a walking tour of Assisi with our local guide to visit the tomb of Blessed Carlos Acutis, who will be canonized a saint this summer in the Jubilee for youth. Sam, our youth minister, was teaching our confirmation students about him, so I found it fitting here to pray for our young people and those to be confirmed. It is easy for us, in times like these, to get discouraged and sad because children and grandchildren no longer practice the faith. Our young people have to face great challenges with the noise of the world so loud and overwhelming. Yet, with Blessed Carlos he was able to overcome that noise and find peace in the Lord and in the Eucharist. He didn't abandon the material things of the world like St. Claire and St. Francis, but he was able to discipline himself with

the material things of the world so that they did not rule his life. He used them as a way to evangelize and spread the good news of Jesus Christ. As pilgrims of hope, it was important to visit and pray before him because his life can help us be hopeful rather than discouraged and sad, for our younger generation.

We then walked along to the [Basilica of St. Francis of Assisi](#). Here we entered into the first of many Jubilee Churches to pray at the tomb of St. Francis. Like my previous experiences, while it can feel a bit rushed because the line has to keep moving, it was nice to just find an empty pew and pray. But it was edifying to see so many people come to the Church and do the same. While it can easily become just a tourist trap because of its history and the frescos that were painted in the Middle Ages, you can't help but just stop and pray. The life of St. Francis has had a profound influence on my life, my discernment and as a priest, so it is always a special time to come and pray at this Church.

After our time at the Basilica of St. Francis and some free time to grab some lunch, we made our walk to [The Church of St Damian](#), the place where St. Francis originally heard the call to rebuild God's house, where he wrote the famous poem *The Canticle of the Creation* and where St. Claire prayed and died. This walk and tour was the perfect ending to the day we spent in Assisi.

As I said at the beginning of this blog, "There is a calm and peaceful atmosphere that allows one to just receive the beauty of the Umbria region and to hear the whispers of God speaking through the frescos of the Churches and the lives of the saints." This picture captures that:
