SSVP – TURNING DEBT INTO HOPE

As you are probably aware, Pope Francis has declared this year a year of Jubilee, with the theme, Pilgrims of Hope. We who believe in Jesus are called to bring hope to the world. The origin of the tradition of jubilee comes from Leviticus (ch. 25). God told Moses that every fiftieth year was to be set aside for the return of the absent members to their households, the restoration of land to its owners, the release of slaves, and the forgiveness of debts.

In his invitation letter to mark the 2025 Jubilee, *Spes Non Confundit* ("Hope does not disappoint", Rom 5:5), Pope Francis reminds us that "hope should be granted to the billions of the poor who often lack the essentials of life" and that "the goods of the Earth are not destined for a privileged few but for everyone." Inspired by this profound call to justice, Caritas Internationalis, together with faith-based and civil society organizations, invites all people of goodwill to join our campaign, Turn Debt into Hope. Together, we urge decision-makers to prioritize people and planet over mere profit. Unsustainable and unjust public debt strips nations of the resources needed to invest in health, education, climate action and the futures of their young people, locking entire generations into cycles of poverty and inequality. This compels us to demand debt justice for communities crushed by unjust and unpayable debts.

As members of Saint Vincent de Paul who work with the poor in our community, we stand in solidarity with those who work to end poverty in our world. We encourage all parishioners to sign the petition found on the Development and Peace or Caritas website, calling on public, private and multilateral creditors, as well as political leaders, to act with courage and compassion in dealing with unjust and unsustainable debts. <https://devp.org/en/campaign/turn-debt-into-hope/act-debt-2025/>

This year as part of the Jubilee 2025, we are called to be Pilgrims of Hope. Celebrated every 25 years, a Jubilee is a special year of forgiveness and reconciliation that invites us to come back into right relationships with God, with one another, and with all of Creation. This tradition is inspired by the biblical year of jubilee, a time when debts were cancelled, slaves were set free and the land was allowed to rest (Lev. 25, Deut. 15).

Development & Peace along with the bishops of Canada are responding to Pope Francis' call to join the Jubilee global Catholic campaign, Turn Debt into Hope by inviting us to sign a petition asking to:

- Cancel unjust and unsustainable debts
- Prevent further debt crises by tackling the root causes of indebtedness
- Establish a multilateral debt resolution mechanism within the United Nations.

PASTOR'S BLOG

Errors and Omissions

It was pointed out to me that I made a mistake in last weeks blog. I fact checked and sure enough, I was wrong. It should be Blessed Carlo Acutis, not Carlos.

Also, it looks like the end of my blog was cut off. Here is the picture that captured my experience in Assisi:



Florence

The best way to describe the next portion of the pilgrimage was a move from the Middle Ages to the Renaissance Period travelling from Assisi in the region of Umbria to Florence in the region of Tuscany. The connection between the two cities is St. Francis of Assisi and the Franciscan order who in their ministry came to help the poor in the city of Florence. Just think that as pilgrims we drove in a coach bus where St. Francis walked in cheaply made sandals or barefoot.

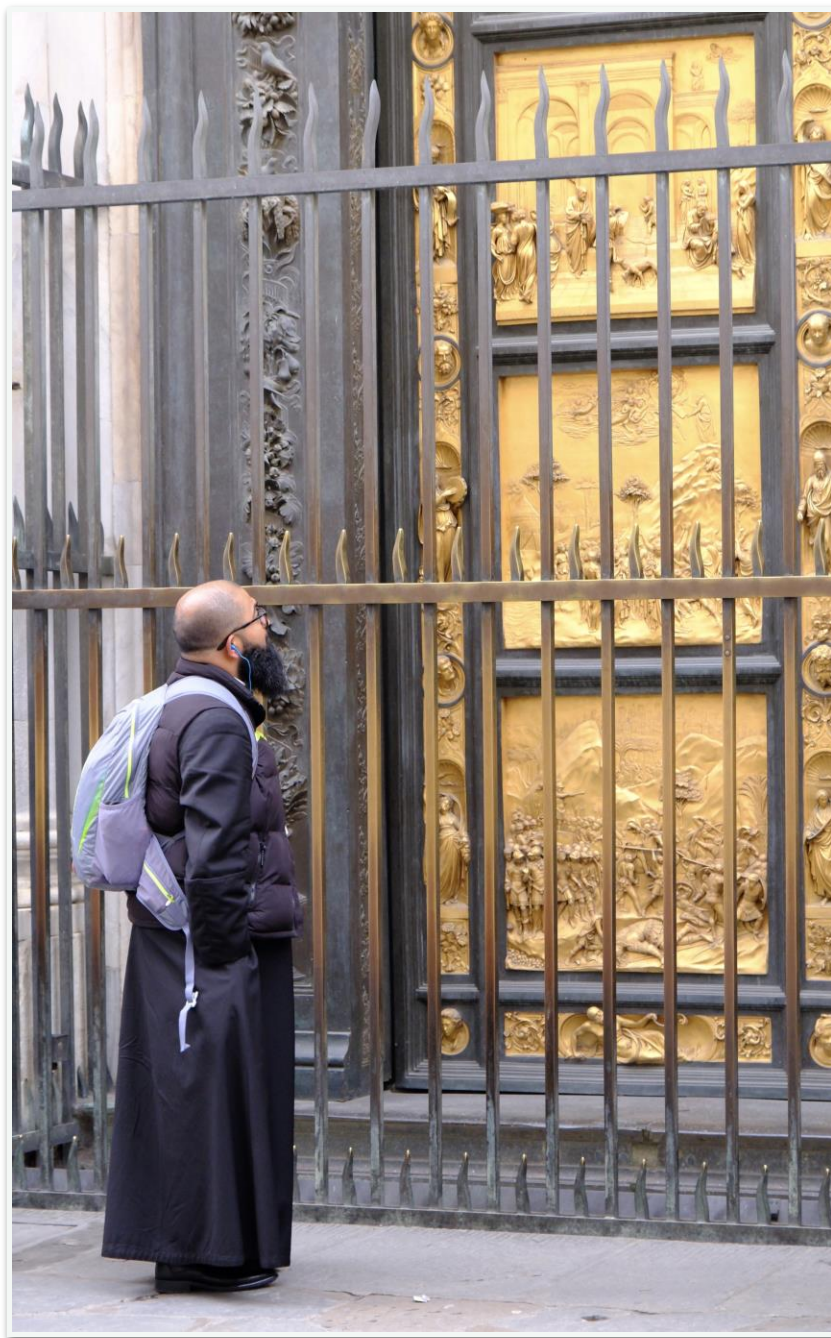
One of the blessings of being in Florence was my sister, Maria, joining us for our time in the city. It was a week off for her school in Brussels, so the timing was perfect. We walked from the coach bus drop off point to the market square in front of the Basilica of Santa Croce, one of the monumental Franciscan churches. We had some free time before we met our local guide, so Maria and I went for lunch to catch up. Following a delicious lunch, we walked over to one of the best gelato spots and for the first time I had an Affogato (origins in Florence) - espresso with gelato. (I went with pistachio gelato...cant go wrong LOL)

We then met up with our local guide and got an overview of the city's history. This was followed by a tour of the basilica. With an engineering background, it was fascinating to hear about the building, the style of architecture which I was not familiar with "Florentine Baroque" which softens the traditional Baroque style which was more common in that era. While in the basilica we also went to the tombs of two very important people, Galileo and Michelangelo.

As a priest with an engineering background, the story of Galileo is always one that interests me - he desired to be a loyal son of the Church and hold onto his scientific principles. Faith and science both seek the truth while asking different questions - never opposing one another but working together. The second person, Michelangelo, would be the person who would dominate the rest of my thoughts and prayers throughout the day. Because I am not an art history major I decided that before going on the pilgrimage and while on it, to learn more about him - historically and spiritually. Bishop Robert Barron named him one of his "Pivotal Players" and put together an hour long documentary on his life, so that was a good resource. While we did not get to see the sculpture "The David" (the museum is closed on Mondays) we would get to see many other pieces of art that he was commissioned for in Rome. It is with Michelangelo, his mentors and contemporaries that we see the shift in artwork from the Middle Ages to the Renaissance - a humanism that comes forth in his art - the form and structure of his sculptures that makes things come alive in a new way.

After our tour of the Basilica of Santa Croce, we went for a walking tour of the city learning more about its history and arrived at the *Duomo*, the Cathedral of Florence - Santa Maria del Fiore. Much of what we learned about this marvelous building and Cathedral was done on the outside especially staring up (Note: my neck hurt on this pilgrimage from looking up a lot...) and seeing the dome and the artwork on the outside.

Across from the Cathedral was the baptistery, that had its own beauty, especially with the intricate work of art done on the bronze doors.



When we had finished just standing, looking and listening to all that could be said about these beautiful buildings, we walked to the Basilica San Marco where we would offer Holy Mass. I was asked by one of the pilgrims how do I prepare a homily for a day like we had. We really do not have much time to sit down and prepare a homily with walking all day, listening to historical facts from local guides, anecdotes, and chatting with pilgrims. But the daily homily on pilgrimage is a good reminder that we are pilgrims, not tourists and everything that we see through the historical and geopolitical lens also has a spiritual lens which is important for our salvation. So the homily writes itself if you are paying attention to the Holy Spirit. In Florence at the Basilica of San Marco, it was clear to preach on the need for beauty. While Michelangelo and other artists like Giotto worked on their forms, "The David" being this perfect sculpture of a man - balanced, harmony, proportioned - it is only a glimpse of the beauty of God and how He creates and re-creates. We are his masterpiece and everyday he wants us to be transformed into Him.



This was only day 1 of Florence. Next week I will go into day 2 in Florence and our day in Siena.

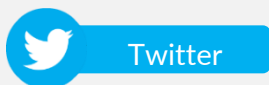
