News and Noteworthy

Before I jump into the blog, I just wanted to bring to your attention a few important dates that are coming up:

March 25th: Annual Consecration to Mary

In his Bull of Indiction for the Holy Year Jubilee, *Spes non Confundit*, 24, Pope Francis wrote:

Hope finds its supreme witness in the Mother of God. In the Blessed Virgin, we see that hope is not naive optimism but a gift of grace amid the realities of life. Like every mother, whenever Mary looked at her Son, she thought of his future. Surely, she kept pondering in her heart the words spoken to her in the Temple by the elderly Simeon: "This child is destined for the falling and rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed, so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed – and a sword will pierce your own soul too" (Lk 2:34-35). At the foot of the cross, she witnessed the passion and death of Jesus, her innocent son. Overwhelmed with grief, she nonetheless renewed her "fiat", never abandoning her hope and trust in God. In this way, Mary cooperated for our sake in the fulfilment of all that her Son had foretold in announcing that he would have to "undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again" (Mk 8:31). In the travail of that sorrow, offered in love, Mary became our Mother, the Mother of Hope. It is not by chance that popular piety continues to invoke the Blessed Virgin as *Stella Maris*, a title that bespeaks the sure hope that, amid the tempests of this life, the Mother of God comes to our aid, sustains us and encourages us to persevere in hope and trust...I am confident that everyone, especially the suffering and those most in need, will come to know the closeness of Mary, the most affectionate of mothers, who never abandons her children and who, for the holy people of God, is "a sign of certain hope and comfort".

Together with the faithful of the Archdiocese of Toronto, we will have our consecration to Mary in place of devotion to her parents, St. Ann and Joachim, following Mass on March 25th. We will have two Masses offered on this solemnity, 9am and 7pm. We have been provided with a lot of resources to help prepare for this consecration; so, I would invite you to visit the Archdiocese of Toronto website to access those resources to privately prepare.

ShareLife Sunday

Next weekend, March 29/30 2025, we officially begin the annual ShareLife campaign. Last year we exceeded our goal and this year our goal is \$110,000. Please see the bulletin boards around the Church, the newsletter for important information and the designated envelopes and reports at the doors of the Church to learn how your donation goes to support local charities around the Archdiocese of Toronto. On behalf of those charities, thank you for your ongoing financial and spiritual support for a successful campaign.

Family Day of Confessions

Over the past few years, I have been listening to some of the obstacles that come up when it comes to going to confession, especially for families. So this year, we are offering a family day of confessions. What that entails is that in the hall we will be offering activities for children who are unable to go to confession and for children who have already made their confession. This allows parents to go to confession knowing that their children are occupied with fun faith filled activities. To accommodate sleep schedules and feeding schedules, we are offering two time slots:

- 1) Saturday April 5th 11am-12:30pm
- 2) Saturday April 5th 2pm-3:30pm

There will be multiple priests to help with confessions, so please take this opportunity for confession during the Lenten season. And to be clear, this is open for everyone but please give priority to parents with young children.

On Friday April 11th, we will be having our parish day of confessions. Similar to previous years, there will be opportunities throughout the day to go to confession with visiting priests. This will be the last chance for confessions before Easter at St. Mary's.

Blog

That is a lot of news and over the coming weeks. So, if you forget, not to worry, you will continue to hear more about these events in the coming weeks as we get closer to their celebrations. Now onto the blog...

Last week, I concluded the pilgrims tales after our first full day in Florence. The next day was also a full day in Florence, but a little bit different. It was the only day that we really had to dress for rain ([nothing like what happened this past week in Florence](#)). But the rain wasn't going to distract us from our itinerary for the day. We were going to continue our walking tour with our local guide and conclude with Mass at the *Duomo*. It was a fun walk as we continued to learn more about this historic city and with a little more time outside the *Duomo* we were able to pay attention to some of the minor details. Clad in red, green and white marble, this Cathedral includes the external Baptistry (see last week's blog) and Giotto Bell Tower, making it one of the largest Cathedrals in the world. The symbol of Florence, the red *Fleur de Lis*, adorns the wall representing both the cathedral's name *Santa Maria del Flores*.

What I learned was that the Dome of the Cathedral is an architectural masterpiece and how it was made still brings architects to their knees. Michelangelo would take that work and replicate it, as close as possible, to the dome that sits on top of St. Peter's Basilica. But the architect died before he could actually finish what he started with his desire for the interior of the dome. It was painted by a local artists Vasari and Zucconi, the last judgement scene.



Following our tour, we would offer Mass in this magnificent Cathedral in one of the side chapels. What a great privilege! I don't remember exactly what I preached about, but I do recall one awesome experience. In offering the Mass, using the Roman Canon (Eucharistic Prayer 1) there is a point before the consecration where the priest is instructed to turn his gaze up. So, as I turned my eyes to the heavens, I saw this scene. And it was just a very powerful moment of all the angels and saints,

the great multitude of heavenly hosts being present at every Mass. I said that my neck hurt last week from looking up all the time, but at this one moment, time seemed to have stopped and Mass took on an eschatological character - what we are waiting with hope, the coming of Our Lord Jesus in all his glory and to usher in this universal judgement.

After Mass, we went from the sacred to the banal and vulgar, shopping. Its not a bad thing because Maria and I got to spend some time together and continued to catch up on all things “Simoes” and her plans for the summer. We did this over a beautiful lunch with a bottle of Brunello and Florentine steak. We thought we wouldn't be able to finish, but we did. N.B. Florentine steak is delicious, but make sure you have an appetite to finish!

After our meal, we needed to walk it off, so thats what we did. We did some window shopping, some actual shopping and found ourselves back at the hotel for a rest before cocktails and supper. It was another amazing day despite the rain.

All good things come to an end...except on pilgrimage. The next day we departed from Florence and made our way to Siena, the city where St. Catherine was born and lived. It was a short day trip to Siena but definitely rich in spirituality. St. Catherine was born in 1340 lived a short 33 years but would be considered to modern ears, an “influencer”. She was a nurse who cared for the most destitute in society. She was a deeply rooted in the life of the Church, had several mystical visions of Christ and devoted herself to the church. She is most famous for going to the Pope in Avignon encouraging him to go back to Rome and exercise his Petrine ministry.



Our walking tour started at the Basilica Cateriniana de Dominico (The brown church in the foreground). The Church definitely carries a noble simplicity inside which is quite the contrast to the other churches that we had seen. Because I was not in wonder and awe staring at so many frescos, it made it easier to sit and pray with St. Catherine's relics...her finger and her head. The rest of her body is in Rome (for another blog). After our time of prayer and tour, we continued our walk through the historic city stopping in at the house where St. Catherine was born and raised. It was turned into a sanctuary and a beautiful place of prayer with many frescos and paintings depicting her life, including one with her receiving the stigmata (the wounds of Christ crucified) and the mystical exchange of her crown of glory for a crown of thorns.

We continued our walk from her childhood house on to the Duomo of Siena (Larger white Church in the background). **We definitely got our steps in on this day along with a lot of stairs and

elevations.** When we made it to the Duomo, it was stunning. Finally my neck got a rest as we didn't need to look up, but got to look down at the beautiful marble work of the Cathedral. It just captured the artistic talent of that time but with great attention paid to teaching and catechesis. There are many, but this one is the most stunning that depicts Lady Wisdom and Lady Folly and the journey of



wisdom (Which worked well for the homily the following day):

At the end of our walking tour of the Duomo, we were given some free time to grab lunch and explore the city. At the conclusion of our day, we made it to the bus and we were on our way to Rome.
