Now we watch the scheming shift from the questioning of His legitimacy by the chief priests, to a more insidious scheme by spies to entrap Jesus in His words so that they could hand Him over to the governor. Isaiah had prophesied that Spirit of wisdom and knowledge would rest on Christ (Isaiah 11.2) and it shines here in brilliance as these spies are confounded in their efforts and forced to admit that He has spoken well. Jesus will, in turn, question them regarding David's prophesy and then pronounce seven (the number of completion) judgments ¹ on the Pharisees and teachers of the law, which end with these heart-wrenching words of prophecy—

"O Jerusalem, Jerusalem, you who kill the prophets and stone those sent to you, how often I have longed to gather your children together, as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings, but you were not willing. Look, your house is left to you desolate. For I tell you, you will not see Me again until you say, 'Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord.' "
